Freshmen, Senior B's Lead In Total Honor Number On School's First Period Grade List

Participating in class work and knowing answers to test questions paid dividends to 425 students at Riley. Almost 26% of the school enrollment is represented on the first nine weeks Honor Roll.

Just starting their high school career, 73 9B's started out on the right foot by being on the Honor Roll. Having 284 in their class, 26% of them found that their report cards had 12 or more points to place among the honor students of the school.

At the other end of the school career found the Senior B's having 71 out of a possible 196. 37% is very excellent but this year's senior class is one of the smallest to graduate in the past few years.

With 245 in the 10A class, 35% of them found that they were able to attain at least 12 points. Just one percentage point behind them was the 11A group with 34% attaining Honor Roll status. Making their next to last grading period in Riley the 12A group put 32% of their 28 on the high merit rating. 191 11B's put 56 in the elite class of students; that is a 29 percentage.

The other half of the Freshmen class, the 9A's had 27% of their 97 total on the scholastic honor team. The eighth graders for their 156 enrollment had 42 on the Honor list for 26% percentage. With the second highest group in the school, the 10B's had 21% of their 245 on the Honor Roll. The 7B's and 7A's

Knowledge, Hard Work Pays Off To Students

1636 students from the 7th to the 12th grade make up Riley High School. Almost one out of every four students found that their diligence to their studies paid off with the reward of being on the Honor Roll.

A minimum of 4 solids must be carried and no character grade of less than M can be gotten to be on the honor roll. If music is carried as a 5th solid, 15 points must be obtained. Students carrying 4 solids must obtain 12 points, carrying 5 solids you must obtain 15 points. Student cannot list 6 solids for Honor roll.

An A is worth four points, a B is worth three points, a C is worth two points, and a D is worth 1 point.

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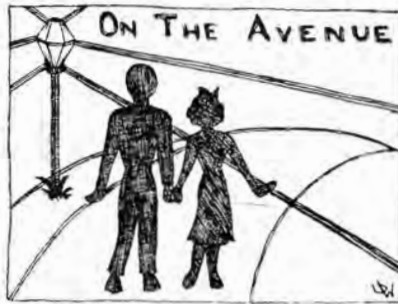
