Stevenson - 534





Receiving a forfeit from Elkhart Roosevelt November 1, Coach Roy Hafner's Freshman Football team, ended their season with a record of 4 wins, 4 losses and 1 tie.

Their first game with Mishawaka resulted in a 0-0 tie at Studebaker Park. Traveling to LaPorte for their second battle, the frosh emerged victorious with a 12-0 score. The game was highlighted late in the 4th quarter when freshman end Walter Gosc intercepted a LaPorte pass and carried 55 yards for the TD.

Facing a powerful Washington line September 20, the freshmen were defeated by the Panthers 7-0. Again traveling out of town, they handed Elkhart (Central) a smashing 21-6 defeat.

Losing to Central 13-7 at Studebaker Park, the frosh went on to capture a 13-6 win over Elkhart Northside on October 11.

Traveling to Adams October 18, the freshmen met their third loss of the season by dropping to the Eagles 25-6. Again, on October 25, they faced defeat at the hands of Michigan City. This concluded their season with the exception of the Elkhart (Roosevelt) forfeit on November 1 giving them their season record of 4 wins, 4 losses, and 1 draw.

The Riley team was the first northern team, however they were in sixth place with 189 points.

Powerful Muncie Central was first with 89 points, Anderson 107, Marion 110, Indianapolis Tech 122, Crispus Attucks 180, and Riley.

Dave Redding, easy running senior from Fort Wayne South Side took invididual honors in 9 minutes 49.9 seconds. Dave Fritz and Louie Cass were fifteenth and sixteenth with a hair between them in 10:18. Rodger McKee was 45, Jim Manuszak 56, Bill Barnes 60, Ken Selby 76, and Don Hanish 129.

Captain Jim Manuszak a senior in home room 308 has run between third and fourth man all year. Manuszak already has his sweater in cross country.

Dave Fritz, senior vice-president in 301, has been between first and second man all year. He is a three letter man, two in cross country, the other in track.

Fritz's average finish as man one on Riley's team is 1.72 and average finish for meets is 3.72.

Rodger McKee another senior is in 320 at the start of the day. Rog has run between third and fourth man this season also. This is Rodger's first letter.

Kittens Upset Devils 13-6 To End Season Under Horvath At 5-3-1


