The following pointers are basic facts to clarify the meaning of swimming meets for the spectators.

Swimming meet events include the 40 yard free style, 100 yard free e, 100 yard breast stroke, 100 yard back stroke, individual medley, diving, medley relay and free style relay.

Free style means that any stroke can
the fastest stroke, the Crawl is used.

## Medley Features Team

Medley means three different strokes in one race . . . back stroke, breast stroke, and crawl. In the individual medley each swimmer swims 40 yards back stroke, 40 yards breast stroke, and 40 yards crawl without stopping.

The medley relay has three swimmers on a team ... one boy swims 60 yards breast stroke, another boy swims a 60 -yard crawl. Each boy on the four member free style relay team swims 40 yards.
