In the first inter-city basketball clash this season, Riley's Wildcats came out with flying colors as they eked out a victory over Washington 40 to 38 in overtime. Buzz Wintrode dropped in a pair of free throws with six seconds left for the margin of victory, thus ending a four-game losing streak.

Using an attack that varied from fast-breaking to virtually standing still, Riley pulled out all the stops to win.
