TIME Prints Swiss Arithmetic Problem; Williams Quickly Solves; U. of M. Students Take 6 Hours main test and were now working on the

Recently a test was given by Miss Elizabeth Murphy to her Algebra I class. The test included an optional problem which Time magazine had taken from a sixth grade Swiss arithmetic book. The problem was: a number of pamphlets are separated into three piles. The first pile contains one-sixth of the total, the second pile several-fifths of the total, and the third contains six. What is the total number of pamphlets?

As the last Hi-Times was issued the Wildcats had won five out of their last six games, and had just trounced North Side in what Coach Stewart described as the best team effort yet. Since then, the darkness has come.

With the Wildcats stone cold, Adams pulled ahead to a 14-7 first quarter score. Then a ray of light sprang through. Led by Reinke, Evard, and South, Riley came roaring back to take a 31-29 half time lead. Following the intermission, the Eagles went on a scoring spree and Riley went back to their first period coldness, the game ending 72-51. Reinke was high point man with 19.

Looking ahead, the Wildcats tonight face an Elkhart five that is now playing like their pre-season predictions. Could things get any darker? Come on Dawn!

Grapplers Lose Again, But Gain Experience


