



FORTUNE ALSO SMILED UPON our basketball team. After a less than average season, the Riley roundballers sparked to life in the sectional tourney.


In the opening round of the Sectional, Joe Kramer led the attack to slap the Adams cagers by a score of 57 to 50. The game saw Riley lead all the way.

The hoped for good luck did not hold for Riley as they finally dropped the contest 65-59. However, most important, Riley finished the game and the season with their finest performance.


