

Riley will again be the scene of the Model United Nations Assembly to be held November 17 and 18. It will be under the auspices of the Riley Social Studies Department. Mr. Burton Brenneman, assisted by Mr. Doug Simpson are in charge of the Riley delegations. Dennis Gay has been chosen the president of the 1967 S.B.M.U.N.A.

The assembly has been held at Riley since its first year in 1964 when Mr. Simpson and Mr. Richard Thompson first thought of the idea of a Model U.N., patterned after the international agency, the United Nations. The Model U.N. gives the student an opportunity to take international problems and deal with them as delegates do in the United Nations. Each delegation becomes acquainted with their own country, and in negotiations can evaluate and understand the problems of other nations. Delegates are made aware of the difficulties facing the U.N. and through policy making the students learn the methods of power politics.

All of Riley's countries are in the neutral bloc, and the delegates hope to be able to work together effectively. Before the assembly begins, the countries will meet and plan strategy. Riley hopes to make an effective bloc by agreeing on issues and pushing for the desired goals.

The program of events for the U.N. will begin at 2:30 Friday, November 17 with registration. The first plenary session of the General Assembly will begin at 3:00 with introductions and the election of the committee chairmen and rapporteurs. From 5:20 to 6:30 committee meetings will be in session. There is a dinner from 6:30 - 7:30 for all delegates and sponsors. From 7:30 to 9:00 p.m. there will be bloc and committee meetings. Saturday morning at 8:30 a.m. the day will begin with a caucus. The second plenary session will meet and be followed by the reports of the committees. The last report will be over at 12:30
