Thirty Transfers Up Riley Enrollment

According to Mr. Joseph Lawecki, Riley vice principal, the largest number of transfer students to Riley comes from Marian High School this fall. Fourteen of the thirty new upperclassmen enrollees registered between August 1 and August 25 attended Marian in Mishawaka last year.

Additional transfer students have attended schools in Michigan, Illinois, Wisconsin and Kentucky and as far away as Bangkok, Thailand.

Upperclass students enrolling here for the first time are required to register with Mr. Lawecki and provide personal and academic information which becomes a part of their permanent records. Their programs are then planned by Mrs. JoAnn Hammond, head counselor.

Riley's total enrollment at the end of August was reported to be 1435.

A.F.S. BRINGS TWO TO RILEY

Riley High School hosts two foreign exchange students during the 1970-71 academic year. The visitors, who come to Riley from Spain and Iran through the efforts of the American Field Service, will follow a normal schedule of classes while fulfilling a series of speaking engagements in the community.

NEW CHANTS FOR CHEERLEADERS

During the three and a half days at camp, "we were cheering almost constantly," Tammy Kil reports. Several new chants and songs were adopted for 1970-71 sports events.

In addition to new cheerleaders and new cheers, varsity team members have been

outfitted with new gold and purple uniforms which were seen for the first time at the Football Jamboree on September 4. The girls report that the new outfits are "the best ones Riley has ever had."

B-team cheerleaders, also named last spring, are Marla Farrar, Mary Lou Freitag, Pam Gay, Debbie Ritter, Mary Rose Turner, and Sonya Williams. A ten-member freshman squad is partially selected, and will be announced at a later date. Co-sponsors for cheerleading are Miss Diana Timmons and Miss Mary Ellen Schlater.

September 8 is the date of publication of Volume 1, issue 1 of the RILEY REVIEW, a newspaper scheduled for 18 regular issues during the 1970-71 school year. Susan Brambert, a senior, is the first editor of the RILEY REVIEW. Mrs. Phyllis Keays, sponsor of the HOOSIER POET, Riley's yearbook, will also sponsor the new publication. The editorial policy of the newspaper is stated on page two of this issue.

Although a permanent staff has not been assembled, several students, whose names appear in the masthead on page two, served as reporters for the first issue. Staff openings will be filled as quickly as possible by student volunteers. The staff will meet in the publications office adjacent to room 301.

Susan Brambert has had experience in publications having served in an editorial capacity on both the HI-TIMES and the HOOSIER POET. She will continue to serve as assistant editor of the student life section on the yearbook. Susan is a member of National Honor Society and last year was awarded membership in Quill and Scroll. Her other activities have included G.A.A. and French Club, and she has served as a home room officer.

The business staff, headed by Bob Nevel, will function for both newspaper and the yearbook. Photography will similarly be handled for both publications by a staff directed by Dave Martin. According to the sponsor, Mrs. Keays, these two departments will function at maximum efficiency when duties are not duplicated.

The RILEY REVIEW will be available only through subscription which will be solicited until September 15. No single copy sales will be made. Students and other school personnel may use the subscription blank which appears on page three, or obtain a facsimile subscription blank from home room teachers or from the sponsor. Papers will be distributed to subscribers' lockers on alternate Fridays while school is in session. The deadline for news and feature items for each issue will be the Sunday prior to each Friday publication date between September 8 and May 28.

The RILEY REVIEW will be printed in Mishawaka by the Cooperative Publishing Company, a firm established in that city in 1930 by John D. Rhodes. The current owner-manager, Robert Rhodes, son of the founder, employs a staff of eighteen in the print shop and office. Cooperative Publishing Company prints several other newspapers, including the COUNTRYMAN'S PRESS, the official publication of the Farm Bureau. The company's facilities will permit the RILEY REVIEW to employ modern offset methods and increase the staff's familiarity with newspaper production.

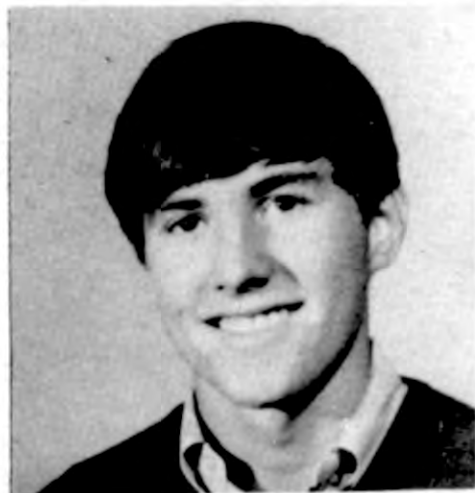
Vice-president Tammy Kil is a varsity cheerleader and the editor of the senior section of the HOOSIER POET. She is a member of the Quill and Scroll Society

PLAY SCHEDULED FOR OCTOBER

Written by Dion Boucicault, a 19th century Irish-American playwright, "The Phantom" is a horror-melodrama set in Cromwellian England spanning two centuries in two acts.

The hero of the play, a vampire, is shot sometime in the 1600's. He is buried, according to his wish, on the peaks of Snowden, and in the second act, set a century later, terrorizes the countryside during his monthly excursions under the full moon. His eventual expiration forms the climactic hub of the play.

The idea for "Phantom's" production was the brainchild of Wally Jessup, a veteran of the Drama Club. Tryouts for the roles will be held after school begins.

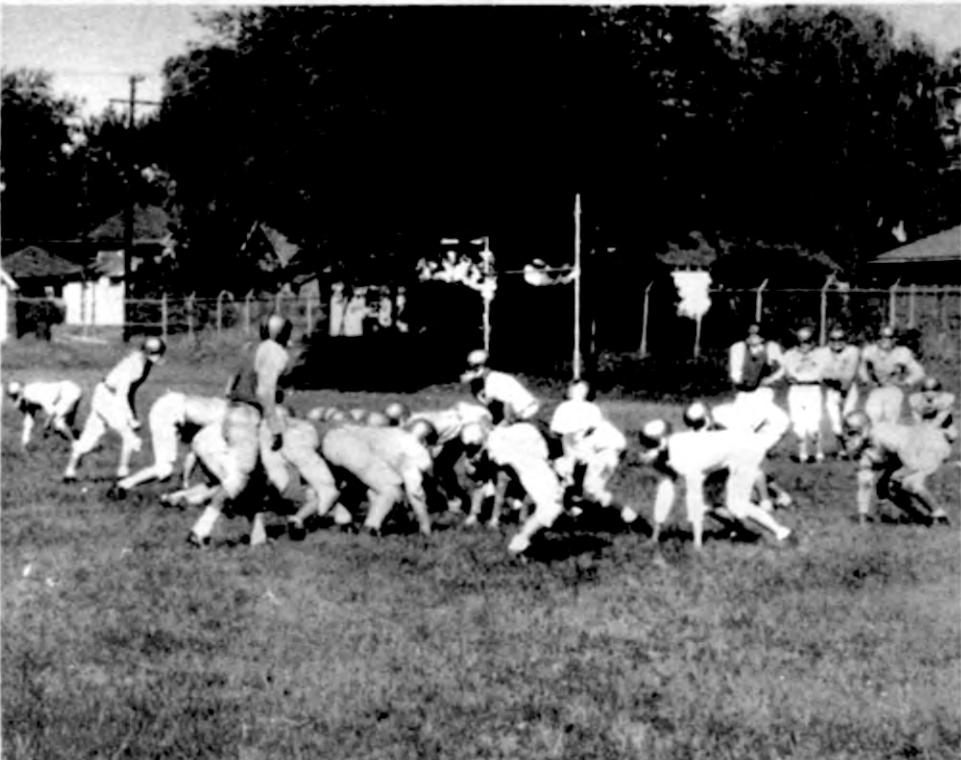
Tennis Playing Ready
