It's all in the bag for freshman English students

Dying people, murder mysteries, Dungeons and Dragons, TV commercials, and almost anything else made up the "impromptu" skits recently put on by Mrs. Carol Hedman's freshman AP English classes.

The assignment, called "With What You Have" consisted of students pulling objects out of a paper bag. The classes were divided into groups according to rows. The first ad was a Christmas "blue-light special" K-mart commercial, complete with the familiar "Merry Christmas . . . from your K-mart Christmas store" jingle, a plastic poinsetta, a bow, and a Christmas ornament.

Next followed a candle commercial, followed by an ad for a play starring Connie Stevens. Winding up the series of sponsors was a sales pitch for a soap that's supposed to make the skin beautiful. In the meantime, Liam and his partner continued their differences. "The situation was resolved by an angry mother calling the children away from the TV," said Liam.

"It was a very difficult assignment and posed many challenges," said Richard Grey, "sponsor" of the candle ad. Joel agreed. "We're lucky it wasn't a very important grade."

Debaters keep busy schedule with victories at IUSB, ND

Debate team members have been extremely busy lately. Three recent debates add up to plenty of researching in the library.

The sub-varsity teams of David Clark/Doug Dunham and Sally Kirwan/Dan Hennessy combined to win first place overall in the sub-varsity division at the GregPetty Memorial Debate at IUSB on December 10. Clark and Dunham received third and fourth best speaker ribbons, respectively. Kirwan and Hennessy were the only Riley team to remain undefeated in all four rounds.

The varsity teams of Geoff Klinger/Steve Gardner and Robin Borr/Jerry Maynard combined for a 4-4 record, although they did not place.

Achieving a 6th place overall rating were the novice teams of Bill Flesh/Kevin Klinger and Alice Lerman/Lori Hines. Altogether about 47 teams participated.

The teams of Dunham/Klinger and Borr/Maynard combined to achieve second place overall in the debate at Notre Dame, which included about 20 teams from all over the midwest. Borr and Maynard placed 4th with a 3-1 record. Dunham and Klinger placed 7th with a 2-2 record. Dunham took the eighth place individual speaker award. Only four Rileyites were allowed to compete in this debate.

These same four students competed in the St. Joe Valley Debate held at Penn High School. The results will not be known until May, but Riley is favored to win this competition because they swept it last year.

Trip to Europe scheduled

Riley students are invited to take a 10-day European tour during spring vacation April 1-10, under the direction of Mrs. Lois Claus, former Riley English teacher, and her husband who teaches government at Washington High School.

The group will fly from Chicago to Amsterdam and visit Lucerne, Switzerland; Paris, France; and London, England. Cost of about \$1000 includes two meals a day, sightseeing and admission to many attractions, including Stratford upon Avon in London. EDITORIAL

What happened to Riley's spirit of giving?

Once again the holiday season, that wonderful time of year when the spirit of giving should be in everyone's heart, has arrived. In many places (including schools) the seasonal spirit burst in with all its glory. Unfortunately James Whitcomb Riley High School is not one of those places.

Riley has a strong student body of about 1500. In years past it's been customary to have well publicized food and toy drives around Christmas. Since the student body is "unified" under one roof, special programs and drives to help the poor, underprivileged children, and other less fortunate people can easily be carried out. Riley should turn all of its attention, strength, and energy to "all-out" giving at least once a year, and Christmas time is as good a time, if not better, than any.

Sure, the Marines sponsored a toy drive this year but the only way one knew of it was if he saw the box in the office, heard the hasty PA announcements, or read the bland flyer given out. If the toy drive were done right, with posters throughout the school, creative announcements daily, colorful boxes placed throughout the building (now really, how many people go into the office on a regular basis), and a great deal of publicity and advance planning, it would have been a huge success.

So, why wasn't this toy drive run by a group or club at Riley? Why didn't a committee of the student council, for example, organize themselves and really push the student body to bring in toys to give underprivileged children a merry Christmas? There certainly does not exist an acceptable excuse. All that can be said is that it's a cryin' shame.

The worst part about this whole situation is that 1982 Rileyites would not even have seen a school food drive if it were not for Mr. Garte, who took the initiative to take over this event after seeing that nobody else was running it. Mr. Garte's office of Human Resources did an outstanding job publicizing the food and toy drives in years past, making them very worthwhile. Now that there is no longer an office of Human Resources, however, it should be understood that these events, and every other "Human Resources" related program and responsibility should be taken over by Riley's clubs, groups, and student council.

Wildcats definitely don't want to be known as a bunch of Scrooges, yet the holiday spirit of giving doesn't seem to live at Riley this year as it did in years past. The absence of extensive food, toy, and clothing drives just serves as another mark against a school that once did so much for the community.

One should hope that for the rest of the year, and for years to come, Riley's student council and freshman, sophomore, junior, and senior classes, as well as other groups, will take on some responsibilities. It's time these school groups and their elected leaders get up and do their jobs.

Indeed, it's a pity that the giving part of Riley is not being tapped to its fullest. Apparently selling candy and raising money for various student causes is no trouble. If more attention and time were turned towards raising money and collecting necessities to give away at this time of year, there would be a huge success and Riley would be looked up to by the other schools, the community, and the entire city.

"Combat Rock" gets Clash deserved acclaim

The Clash has to be one of the most misunderstood bands popular today. Despite a few popular successes ("Train in Vain" and "Rock the Casbah") they have been stuck in a "punk" label that has alienated them from a large American audience.

People should give The Clash an honest listen. Their musical style is incredibly varied, much more so than such popular bands as Journey or REO Speedwagon, ranging from heavy metal to jazz to reggae to pop.

The Clash's new album *Combat Rock*, is a case in point. From the opening cut "Know Your Rights" to "Death is a Star," the closer, they play different styles of rock and roll with lyrics more intelligent than anything Bobby Rivers would dare to play.

"Know Your Rights," is a biting, punk call to common people everywhere. The satirical lyrics include "You have the right not to be killed. Murder is a crime, unless it was done by a policeman or an aristocrat." "Car Jamming" is a silly ska song in which Joe Strummer chants, "I thought I saw Lauren Bacall." Maybe he understands it.

Next is the heavy metal song "Should I Stay or Should I Go?" soon to be an MTV video. "Rock

the Casbah," already a popular video, is about an Arab ban on rock and roll. Following that are "Red Angel Dragnet" and "Straight to Hell," a poignant song about the plight of Amerasian children left in Vietnam by American soldiers.

Side two begins with "Overpowered by Funk" which deals with the way people try to escape social pressures. Next is "Atom Tan" about nuclear age consumerism. Then comes "Sean Flynn," a haunting tribute to an IRA member: "You know he heard the guns of war. Each man knows what he's fighting for." The fourth song is "Ghetto Defendant" an explanation of city denizens turning city, and the album ends with the poetic "Death is a Star."

It's astounding that, while Paul McCartney, who gave up rock and roll for money years ago, makes Lord knows how many billion dollars a year. The Clash, a group of hard hitting lyrical geniuses, can be virtually ignored on commercial radio. True, they have made gains in acceptance, especially critical, but they are still nowhere near the popularity they deserve.

There are far more injustices in this world than most of us would like to believe. The Clash is trying to point this out. People scared off by a "punk" label should open their eyes and see the honesty of the Clash.

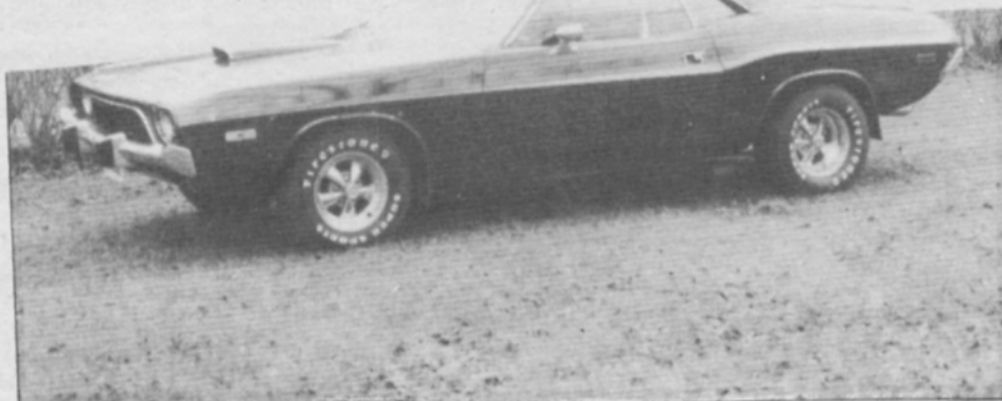

Does America need the "peacemaker?"

Appropriations for the controversial MX missile system were voted down in the House of Representatives last week. Now, pending this week's vote the Senate, the bill for appropriations is, for a time, virtually dead. President Reagan and other supporters of the MX will have to lobby and regroup. The real question underlying all others is: does America need another nuclear weapons system?

While President Reagan and Defense Secretary Weinberger would have one believe the new MX system is vital to defense and arms negotiations, the opposite seems to be the case. It is believed by many House members, Republicans as well as Democrats, that MX is completely unnecessary. The proponents of MX state that this new system would give

America a clear edge over the Soviets and lessen the possibility of a "first strike situation." But in 4 years, it is believed, the Soviets will have the power to wipe out MX in a "first strike."

Lobbyists and others in favor of the MX system believe it would give the U.S. greater power at the nuclear bargaining table. President Reagan seems to imply that in order to bargain for nuclear arms reduction, MX is needed. Building more arms in order to deter a nuclear first strike from the Soviets, just doesn't make sense.

No one can even decide on a way to base the MX. President Reagan's favorite, Dense Pack (having all missiles grouped together) seems very dubious. Wouldn't that be even easier to

wipe out? There is no reason to go ahead with a new missile system if nobody can decide where to put it.

With the economy near the brink of collapse it would seem that the President would have the sense to realize that 26 billion dollars to build missiles is too much to spend right now, in fact, ever. Social security might fail and thousands more people are becoming jobless. One should hope the Senate will recognize the folly of MX and also vote down the appropriations bill.

The MX system (ironically having the tentative title of "Peacemaker") is just one more example of militant collision course the present conservative administration is taking towards economic collapse and nuclear holocaust.



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Riley swimmers subdue highly touted Munster twice for 9-0 record

At the north end of the pool area, a sign said, "Go Wildcat Swimmers--Give It All You Got!" It seems that Coach Dave Dunlap's team took it to heart and gave it their all to beat perennial powerhouse Munster on Tuesday. Before yesterday's meet against conference rival Clay, however, the Munster victory meant another addition to the undefeated season standing of 9-0 (3-0 in the NIC). The 'Cats also made Wawasee, Michigan City Elston, LaPorte, and Crown Point victims to their kick and took the crown at the

Munster Invitational.

The Munster meet, called "cut the Munster" by some fans, included three pool records for the 'Cats and six State qualifying times. Riley started the adrenalin flowing with a record-breaking victory in the 200 medley relay. The team of Stout, Smith, Pieniazkiewicz, and Hay churned to a State qualifying pool record in 1:43.77.

But that wasn't all. The Powerful Pool People continued to glide the waves, capturing every event but diving and the 100 backstroke. Weisser, the

next State qualifier, took the 200 freestyle, followed by a state qualifying 2:03.26. Pieniazkiewicz in the 200 individual medley.

Wimmer charged his way to victory in the 50 freestyle, qualified for State, and earned a pool record of 22.16 all at once. He also took firstplace first place honors while qualifying for State in the 100 freestyle.

To finish washing up the opponents, Riley rinsed off with a State qualifying, pool record-breaking 3:20.4 in the final relay. The 400 freestyle

squad of Weisser, Stout, Hay, and Wimmer clinched the 'Cats victory at 78-49. Also aiding and abetting to the kill was Black, who captured the 100 butterfly.

It's been at least six years since Riley last outswam Munster in a dual-meet. "Munster didn't swim as well as they are capable of swimming," said Coach Dunlap. He also noted that a dual-meet like this early in the season won't mean much during the State meet Feb. 25 and 26 at Indianapolis. "Munster will be a team to be reckoned with at the State meet."

Tomorrow the swimmers start off their holiday vacation in the Troy Relays, a meet similar to the Munster Invitational. According to Coach Dunlap, a team must have quite a bit of depth to do well in the Troy Relays because of the good competition from Michigan and Ohio.

Also keeping the 'Cats busy during the holidays is the Merrillville Invitational on Dec. 21 and 22. The extended rush of competition stays on hold until Jan. 6, when the season gets into full swing again against Mishawaka.

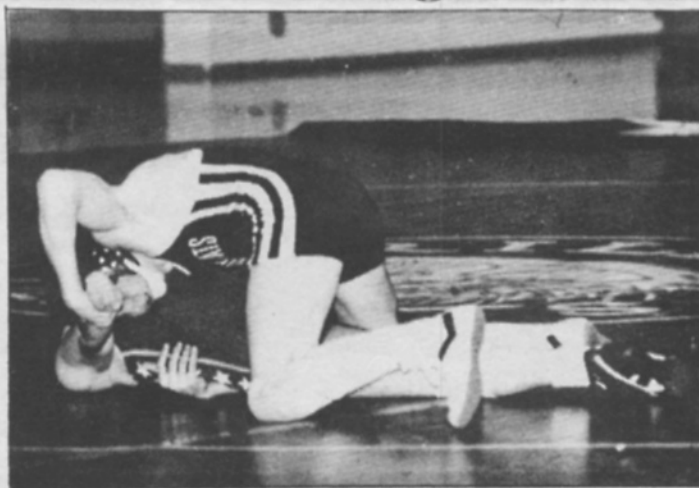

Head Wrestling Coach Chris Clarke may have acquired a few grey hairs last Tuesday as he watched his Wildcat wrestlers come from a 28-10 deficit to claim a 33-31 victory over the St. Joe Indians.

But come from behind victories should be nothing new to the now 4-1 Wildcats. In fact "Cardiac-Cats" might be a better name for Riley's wrestlers who have had to come

from behind to win every match so far this season. The Cats last two matches against Clay (Dec. 10) and St. Joe have been especially close as each meet has gone down to the final match before a victor was determined.

In Riley's 33-25 win over Clay the "Cardiac-Cats" again had troubles in the early goings with freshman Denny Wise being the only wrestler to win in the early bouts when he claimed a

major decision in the 105 lb. class. After Riley dropped the next two matches junior Mike Mersich easily did away with his opponent; scoring a six point fall for the Wildcats. Senior Tim Wirt (132) and junior Rob Bartels (138) added to the Wildcat effort as both wrestlers pulled off close victories.

But with the Cats behind 16-19 and just five matches remaining the Colonials were thinking upset. That is, until senior Scott Vinson stepped on the mat and pinned his 155 lb. opponent; putting the Cats on top 22-19. Senior co-captain Brendan Powers then increased the Riley lead to 26-19 when he won by default after racking up an impressive 19-3 lead. But the match wasn't nearly finished until senior heavyweight Darren Fischer did away with his opponent to seal a Wildcat win.

"I was both pleased and impressed with our performance," Clarke stated after the match. I really didn't think we'd be doing this well at this point in the season but the upper weights have really done a job for us."

Although Riley was a heavy favorite against the struggling St. Joe Indians, the match was another tight one as the "Cardiac-Cats" again won it in the last match of the night.

Riley got started on the right track, bolting out to a 10-0 lead behind a superior decision by freshman John Read (98) and a second period fall from Denny Wise (105). Yet after that things seemed to fall apart as St. Joe swept the next six weight classes; racking up 28 unanswered points. But senior Scott Vinson (155) and Brendan Powers (167) quickly quieted the upset minded St. Joe fans as the two wrestlers reeled off back to back first period falls to put Riley back in the match.
